Middle School

Breaking up is hard to do

This **Wednesday** the middle school will be splitting in half...*again*. Half the school will hike on the **Dragonfly trails**. These students will split into three groups. Once in these groups they will split into even smaller groups and map the trail in three different ways. Through these activities they will be learning **what it takes to be a team** and **how to listen to everyone when making a decision.** Like always, please send your student with their **BIG 5: 2 water bottles, a healthy lunch, a sun hat, 2 or 3 pencils and a journal.** Your student is expected to be ready for the weather so please send them prepared. The other half of the middle school will be starting a project with the **Environmental Protection Agency and**

the Asombro Institute of Las Cruces. The project's purpose is to help us be better energy consumers. The group staying at school will do five rotations; **Insulating you and Insulating the Earth, Energy resources and use, Energy audit, Energy data jam, and Solar energy.** Through these rotations the students will be learning about the relationship between climate and energy.

Pitchfork Ranch

As you read above, **the 8th graders** will be going to the **Pitchfork Ranch** off Hwy 90 on Friday with the Community Orientation class. ***Students must be at school by 7:45 a.m. The BIG 5 is an absolute must!*** It will be warmer there, so wear layers. The Pitchfork Ranch is a labor of love and we are fortunate to be able to visit. According to the ranch's website, "The overarching goal for this ranch is habitat repair, using "flood-n-flow" based restoration practices and accompanying sediment deposition to nudge the ciénaga and surrounding land toward its pre-settlement condition — to get the water back."
